

# **Religious Education Policy - Prep School**

#### **School Mission Statement:**

# To educate young people to meet the challenges of life courageously, to use their talents to the full and to live the values of Christ's Gospel.

Religious education is integrated into the daily life of the children. We seek to create an atmosphere which reflects Catholic values and which gives a sense of belonging to a wider family – God's family.

### **Regulatory Context**

### **Education Act 2005**

Under Section 48 of the Education Act 2005 a Bishop has the right to inspect any Catholic school or college within his Diocese to evaluate the quality of Religious Education and the Catholic nature of the school.

### Code of Canon Law

Formation and education in a catholic school must be based on the principles of catholic doctrine and the teachers must be outstanding in true doctrine and uprightness of life. (Canon 803)

No school, even if it is in fact catholic may bear the title 'catholic school' except by the consent of the competent ecclesiastical authority. The diocesan Bishop has the right to watch over and inspect the catholic schools situated in his territory, even those established or directed by members of religious institutes. He also has the right to issue directives concerning the general regulation of catholic schools; these directives apply also to schools conducted by members of a religious institute, although they retain their autonomy in the internal management of their schools. Those who are in charge of catholic schools are to ensure, under the supervision of the local Ordinary, that the formation given in them is, in its academic standards, at least as outstanding as that in other schools in the area. ### The Aim of Religious Education in this school is:

- knowledge and understanding of ways faith is practised in the other major religions

### AT2

• a response through faith to the ultimate questions of human life, its origin and purpose acquisition of the skills required to examine and reflect upon religiousbelief and practice

- respect for truth, respect for the views of others
- awareness of spiritual and moral responsibility, including towards those who are in most need
- awareness of the demands of religious commitment in everyday life
- awareness of the challenges as well as enrichment of living in a multicultural, multifaith society
- on-going development of each student's potential as a person made in the image and likeness of God
- development of each one's well-being and freedom
